### 2024 BURNS CELEBRATION AND DINNER


In mid-January you will be receiving the annual informational letter and reservation form for the February 24, 2024 Robert Burns

## HURDY-GURDY, A MOST UNUSUAL MUSICAL INSTRUMENT

SAS member, Joe Lalemon, has spent the past several months constructing, from scratch, a hurdy-gurdy. Not your usual hobby, but he provided us with pictures and the following article to describe his efforts:

The origins of the hurdy-gurdy are unknown. It is the first stringed instrument to which the keyboard principle was applied. The bowing action of the fiddle is replaced by a wheel cranked by a handle. The typical one to six drone strings gives the hurdy-gurdy its unique sound much like the drones on a bagpipe. The instrument's common name may be derived from the Scottish word "hiddie-giddie" which means a "giddy head" further defined as a commotion, tumult, strife or uproar (sounds like a description of lots of Scottish history)!

My design and construction of a hurdy-gurdy spanned five full months. The process required making precision wooden and metal parts for the body of the instrument and finding materials and components that could be altered to complete the tuning mechanism. For example, the parts that apply pressure to play the melody strings called "tangents" act much like a finger on a guitar fret. Making them required a precision lathe. I used basswood cribbage board pegs and glued a small ridge of hard maple on them to "fret" the strings. There is still much work to do.



### SAMHAIN GATHERING/WHISKY TASTING

On October 14th, it was necessary to change the location for Samhain this year to the Hawthorne home in Davenport. Twenty-five members and friends were able to take advantage of a chilly autumn evening to enjoy each others' company and a delicious potluck dinner (which included numerous choices of adult beverages). Since the Hawthorne home doesn't have a nice fire pit, the group stood around a flaming grill in the front yard as they called out their clan names. Derek Grant provided his usual piping expertise while the Hawthornes' neighbors probably were wondering what the heck was going on! When returning to a little more comfortable setting indoors, a DVD of one of the Edinburgh Military Tattoos was played on the TV in the back-

ground and Lisa Lockheart shared information about the significance of Samhain in the Scottish calendar. One of the snippets of history of this Celtic celebration she told us about was - As the veil between worlds was believed to be especially thin during the three-day Samhain celebration, the Celts took precautions against spirits who might hold a grudge - and against visiting Fae folk! Mischief, tricks, or even worse, being kidnapped into the Underhill might be the result of a Fae encounter. So to confuse and evade Fae and spirits alike, ancient Samhain celebrants might: 1)Turn their coats inside out, 2) Disguise themselves as animals or monsters, or 3) Carry iron or salt. Interesting choices to defend themselves!!





### A GATHERING OF THE CELTS

September 10th at Lake McBride, Solon, IA was the location for the three lowa Scottish organizations (with guests from Nebraska also attending) to picnic together and share ideas as well as getting to know each other better. The groups represented were members from H.A.G.G.I.S from the Cedar Rapids area, SHSI from

the Des Moines area, and our own Scottish-American Society. Hopefully, maintaining these connections will enhance what's available to everyone with Scottish heritage in Iowa, Illinois, and Nebraska or those who simply are interested in just learning more about the Scottish influence in our part of the world.
